Peasant in a Veil (an Apple Pudding)

Ingredients

2lb cooking apples
8 oz Breadcrumbs
3 lbs Castor sugar
3 oz Butter

First stew the apples with 1 table spoon of syrup and lemon juice.

Then melt the butter in a baking tray. Mix the sugar and breadcrumbs and mix into the melted butter. Cook until crisp. Let everything cool. Puree the apple and put in to a bowl layered with the bread crumbs. Finish with whipped cream and top with grated chocolate.

Her Majesty's telegram of congratulation was passed around the tables. Not many centurions are away from their beds after midnight but Mary proved an exception. Billie Bates of Balfron has just enjoyed her 94th birthday.

St Andrews mourns the passing of two notable members of its congregation. Tony Ffinch's face was familiar throughout the locality as an extremely able local councillor. Chris Martin of the Callander Youth Project admirably organised the music and amplification at Tony's Memorial service where every seat was filled. Harry Denholm in later years served the SEC as a distinguished Chancellor of Glasgow Diocese under two Bishops. Latterly he was a Vestry member and an administrator of the chalice at St Andrews. Our prayers and condolences are extended to their respective families. Jackie Pester and Bob Palmer were members of Callander Kirk congregation, but greatly respected at St Andrews. Their passing has left large gaps in our community.

After months of chaos and dust, St Andrews is returning to normal after extensive repair. The church itself closed this time last year with renovations extending into the spring. By this time the dry rot had attacked the west end of the Hall and thus after Easter the hall was evacuated for repair. In the meantime the organ was reinstalled and tuned. St Mary's—Mission Action - News

The Diocesan Casting the Net project at St Mary's has now been in progress for some eighteen months. At its outset, the Vestry drew up a plan known the Mission Action Plan outlining its aims for the future. The Bishop customarily visits those parishes involved at about this point of the project to discuss the Plan and its progress both with the congregation and Vestry.

A few months ago, I won a tee-shirt in a competition. Unfortunately there was no choice of size: it is something like an XXXL and thus rather envelops me. Casting the Net is of course designed for all types and sizes of parish from city churches with large congregations to a rural parish such as ourselves. The knack of making Casting the Net successful is to see that the Mission Action Plan perfectly fits the needs of the area it serves.

What then are the needs of Aberfoyle and its environs? As locals we think we know but probably a good deal is also overlooked.

The Bishop will come to the parish on the afternoon of the 24th October. He hopes to meet both the Vestry and as many members of the congregation as possible. A representative of the National Park has kindly agreed to come and give a presentation about our area to stimulate thought.

The final detail of the day has yet to be finalised, but as Rector I need your support on that day. Could Aberfoyle congregation please hold the late afternoon and early evening free as a matter of priority? More detail of times etc will be announced the Weekly Bulletin and Pew Sheet.

devoted life together. So she left Dollar to be married in January 1951 and she and Archer moved to Balfron after the wedding.

Billie taught for 17 years after she was married, as a peripatetic Primary Art teacher in Killearn and Fintry.

Archer died in 1978 when Mary was 24. Billie has many happy memories of their time with him and quotes "God gave us memories, so that we could have Roses in December".

Billie was brought up in the Church of Scotland, and Mary was christened there. But Archer had been an Episcopalian in Newlands in Glasgow. When he died, his funeral was taken by Rev. John Crook who came to visit Billie. Billie had become disappointed by the Church of Scotland. She felt "out of kilter" with it. And In 1979 she joined St. Mary's in Aberfoyle and has been there ever since.

One of the most important things in Billie's life is her great connection with Cornwall. Her parents had their honeymoon there and after that, as a family, they visited Cornwall regularly. Billie's widowed sister moved there.

Billie's family has been and is very important to her and she is in touch with many of the members of it. The family of St. Mary's is also very important to her and she is a faithful and committed member, very seldom, if ever, missing a service. We are fortunate to be able to welcome her.

For all of her life, Billie has loved painting and drawing, especially drawing; and her beautiful portraits, flower studies and landscapes are proof of that. Many people are the proud owners of a work by Billie Bates.

Billie is a founder member of Stirling NADFAS and lover of Scrabble!

Billie Bates An Interview with Barbara

Williamena Margaret Young was born in Alloa on 4th September, 1919. The fourth of four children having two sisters and one brother. So she has just celebrated her 94th Birthday !

At the very start of my interview with her Billie explained that after a serious illness in infancy she was told, in error, as a young child that she was not expected to develop either mentally or physically - she maintained she was determined to prove the young doctor wrong!

After Alloa Primary she was schooled at Dollar Academy for 6 years where she enjoyed playing hockey among other things, gaining her 1st XI colours in spite of having to wear quarter inch thick glasses because of her extreme short sightedness (inherited from her infancy illness).

On leaving school she went to the College of Art in Edinburgh to study drawing and painting. Four years later, in 1943, she gained her DA and subsequently qualified in teaching by gaining a teaching certificate from Moray House.

In 1943 she was called for interview to Elgin and was appointed to three schools - two Junior Secondarys and one Senior Secondary. However before she went to Elgin she entered a painting for the Annual Exhibition at the Royal Scottish Academy - a painting of daffodils on a window sill in the rain, called April Showers, and was absolutely delighted and amazed to find she had sold it and received £30 in payment! That felt like a fortune!!

She taught in Elgin, Leith and then at Alloa Academy. Her semi-lifelong problems with her eyesight were cured by a cataract operation with implanted lenses giving longer sight and improved enjoyment of colour.

Then a vacancy came up at Dollar Academy. "I couldn't wait to get back", she says "I loved it". She was there for two years.

At a later time she met Archer who was in the R.N.V.R. and who became her husband. She met him via a cousin. Archer was widowed and both Billie and he realised they had a second opportunity to make a
